

## THE LINGUOPOETIC FUNCTION OF METAPHORS AND SYMBOLS IN A LITERARY TEXT

They enrich the text by adding layers of meaning, evoking emotions, and engaging the reader in interpretation. With the help of these devices, authors are able to transform ordinary language into a powerful artistic instrument. It is not like traditional linguistics. Traditional linguistics focuses on structure and grammar while linguopoetics emphasize expressive means and stylistic devices.

The main goal of linguopoetics is to comprehend how linguistic units like sentences, phrases and words are used in a creative way to create artistic influences. These effects consist of imagination, emotional thoughts and symbolic meanings. In this context, metaphors and symbols plays an important role because they transform literal language into figurative and expressive language.

Linguopoetics deals with not only the form of language but also its function in the context. It analyzes how meaning is constructed through stylistic devices and how readers understand these meanings. Readers are based their cultural and cognitive background knowledge when they convey the meaning.

### *Metaphor as Linguopoetic Device: Definition and Nature of Metaphor*

A metaphor is a figure of speech in which one concept is understood in terms of another. It involves a transfer of meaning based on similarity or analogy. For example, when we say “time is a thief,” we are not stating a literal fact but suggesting which time steals moments from our lives.

Metaphors are not only decorative elements; they are fundamental to human thought. Cognitive linguistics suggests that metaphors shape the way we perceive and understand the world. In literary texts, metaphors serve both cognitive and aesthetic functions.

Metaphors can be classified into several types:

1. Conventional metaphors: Common expressions are used in everyday spoken language. For example: “the foot of the mountain”, “to digest the information” and etc.
2. Creative metaphors: They are also called as poetic metaphors. Unique and original expressions are created by authors. The metaphors give the metaphorical meaning only in their masterpieces.
3. Extended metaphors: Metaphors developed over several lines or throughout a text.
4. Conceptual metaphors: These types of metaphors express patterns that structure thought. For instance, “Life is a journey”, “Time is money” and etc.

Each type contributes differently to the linguopoetic structure of a text.

There are some functions of metaphors in literary texts. Metaphors perform several important functions:

- 1) Aesthetic function: They enhance the beauty and expressiveness of language.

- 2) Cognitive function: They assist readers comprehend abstract ideas with the help of concrete imagery.
- 3) Emotional function: They evoke feelings and create emotional depth.
- 4) Text-structuring function: Extended metaphors can unify a text and give it coherence.

For example, in poetry, metaphors often serve as the central organizing principle, shaping the theme and tone of the work.

### *Symbol as a Linguopoetic Device: Definition and Characteristics of Symbols*

A symbol is a sign that represents something beyond its literal meaning. Unlike metaphors, symbols have a more stable and culturally grounded meaning.

For instance, a “rose” may symbolize love, beauty, or transience and it depends on the context. Symbols often carry a lot of meanings and can be interpreted in different ways.

There are 4 main types of symbols. They can be categorized as follows:

- 1) Universal symbols: These types of symbols are shared between cultures. For instance: “light as a symbol of knowledge and enlightenment”, “A dove as a symbol of peace and harmony”, “Water as a symbol of purification and cleansing life”, “Circle as a symbol of unity, eternity and wholeness”
- 2) Cultural symbols: These kinds of symbols are visible in groups, sharing values, beliefs and traditions. They are specific to a particular culture or tradition. For example, “White symbolizes purity in Western cultures, but mourning and death in parts of Eastern Asia”, “The “thumbs-up” shows approval in North America, but it is an offensive insult in parts of Russia and Australia”.
- 3) Personal symbols: Personal symbols express individual experience, memories and associations. They are unique to an individual author’s work.

Others hardly are aware of these sorts of symbols. For instance, “A grandmother’s watch represents security and family legacy”, “A particular park reflects a quiet and calm place”, “A dried rose reminds a first date”

4) Contextual symbols: These sorts of symbols are elements which the readers comprehend them in a particular work of art, story or situation. Their meaning depends on the certain text. For example, “The green light in the masterpiece called “The Green Gatsby” represents Gatsby’s intentions and unreachable goals. “A lightbulb typically expresses an idea, but in a situation in different masterpieces, it can symbolize enlightenment.”

There are some main functions of symbols in literary texts. They serve several linguopoetic functions:

- 1) Representational function: They demonstrate abstract ideas or concepts.
- 2) Integrative function: They connect different parts of a text.
- 3) Interpretive function: They make readers to engage in deeper analysis.
- 4) Emotional function: They evoke feelings through associative meaning.

Symbols often operate on multiple levels and contribute to the richness and complexity of literary texts.

#### *Interaction Between Metaphors and Symbols*

Metaphors and symbols often work together in literary texts. A metaphor can evolve into a symbol if it is repeated and gains a stable meaning within the text. In contrast, symbols can be expressed through metaphorical language. For example, in many literary works, “darkness” may begin as a metaphor for ignorance or fear and gradually become a symbol representing evil or uncertainty. This interaction enhances the depth of meaning and strengthens the overall artistic effect. The combination of

metaphors and symbols permits authors to create a multilayered text in which meaning is not fixed but open to interpretation.

### *Cultural and Cognitive Aspects*

The interpretation of metaphors and symbols is influenced by cultural and cognitive factors. Readers from different backgrounds may understand the same symbol in different ways.

Cognitive linguistics highlights that metaphors are appeared in human experience. For instance, the metaphor “life is a journey” represents a universal human experience of movement and progress. Cultural context also has a significant role. Symbols such as colors, animals, or objects may have different meanings in different cultures. Therefore, understanding a literary text requires awareness of its cultural background.

### *The Role of Context in Meaning Formation*

Context is essential for interpreting metaphors and symbols. The meaning of these devices depends on:

- 1) Linguistic context: The surrounding words and sentences.
- 2) Situational context: The circumstances in which the text is produced.
- 3) Cultural context: The traditions and beliefs of a society.

Without context, metaphors and symbols may be misunderstood or lose their intended influence. Therefore, linguopoetic analysis must consider all levels of context.

### *Reader Response and Interpretation*

The linguopoetic function of metaphors and symbols is not limited to the text itself, but it also attracts the reader. Readers interpret these devices in an active way relying on their knowledge, experience, and imagination. This interpretive process

makes literary texts dynamic and open-ended. Different readers may understand different meanings from the same metaphor or symbol. This variability is one of the key features of literary art.
